
**SIGNIFICANT INVESTIGATIONS / EVENTS / UPDATES**

- February 13, 2012 – Ptl. Rowello began waiver program at Camden County Police Academy for the Basic Course for Police Officers.
- February 14, 2012 – Ptl. Kramer and Ptl. Heron successfully completed the required training at the Cape May County Police Academy – Basic Course for Police Officers.
- February 15, 2012 – E-Ticket Press Conference outlining shared service between seven local municipalities in an effort to reduce costs associated with the purchase of Uniform Traffic Complaint-summonses and the time associated with Officers entering summonses into the department records management system and Court personnel entering summonses into AOC. – Refer to attached Media Package dated February 15, 2012.

On February 8<sup>th</sup>, 2012 The Pine Hill Police Department coordinated with the New Jersey State Police to conduct the Top Physical Challenge (TPC) at The Pine Hill Middle School. Students in the 6<sup>th</sup> grade took part in the event. The New Jersey State Police designed the program to promote physical fitness. The program also functions as a long-term recruiting tool and serves as an introduction to the New Jersey State Police Academy's Trooper Youth Week Program.

As part of the TPC, state police representatives visit Garden State schools and administer the physical fitness challenge, which consists of pushups, sit-ups, pull-ups, the flexed arm hang, the broad jump and the shuttle run. Youngsters receive a certificate of participation and a patch based on their score.

Students that were selected to take part in the event were selected by school staff based on their academic grades and overall good behavior. Before the students participated in the event Troopers briefly discussed the history of the New Jersey State Police and discussed the importance of fitness in Law Enforcement. Then they were introduced to several Troopers and took part in a series of warm up exercises.

At the end of the TPC, all of the 100 percent students are invited down to compete against each other on a future date. The school with the highest overall average will be determined to be the fittest school in the state. The goal is to make students more physically fit and to give them the opportunity to compete against other students. It builds their confidence and self-esteem while interacting with Law Enforcement on a positive level.

Troopers who are involved with the TPC are all instructors at the New Jersey State Police Academy in Sea Girt.

The students expressed their enjoyment while participating in the event. It was an educational and fun event that left the students with a strong sense of commitment, determination and success.

Scheduling the event was coordinated by Trooper Gary Collum of the NJSP and Patrolman Terry L. Hogan of the Pine Hill Police Department. Additional officers from the Pine Hill Police Department were present to show their support. They are as follows; Chief Christopher J. 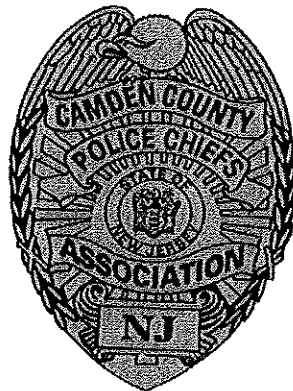

## General Statement and Background Information

The Chiefs of Police and community leaders of the Bellmawr Borough, Pine Hill Borough, Oaklyn Borough, Haddon Heights Borough, Magnolia Borough, Runnemede Borough, and Gloucester Township Police Departments recognize the importance of maximizing the available resources of their officers while on patrol, while saving municipal tax dollars by cutting overhead costs of operations. By collectively entering into a shared service agreement, these seven municipalities have joined forces to put cutting edge technology into operation by sharing the equipment and operating costs.

The system being utilized by these Police Departments is the Advanced Public Safety (APS) QuickTicket™ system. This system enables law enforcement officers to issue traffic citations from the mobile computers they already have. The system software captures data from the already existing Computer Aided Dispatch / Mobile Computer system, and auto-populates an electronic version of the agency's current citation form. Data can be obtained via motor vehicle queries, or from a swipe or scan of the offender's driver's license. The officer then selects the applicable violation from a drop-down menu and the system automatically calculates and populates the appropriate statute number, fine and court information on the ticket. Multiple citations can be issued during the same traffic stop simply by selecting different violations and printing the tickets. The ticket printout is fully customized to match the design requested by each agency.

This E-Ticketing system decreases errors and increases efficiency. In the U.S., 20-30% of all traffic citations are dismissed because of incorrect statute numbers, incorrect violations, and/or other administrative data errors. The APS QuickTicket™ system ensures all the information entered on the traffic citation is 100% correct, and all copies of the citation are completed in professional, legible print, which reduces confusion to the violator who receives a summons.

Using this E-Ticketing technology, an officer spends less time on the side of the road, and less time in contact with the suspect, making it safer for the officer. In addition it shortens the time of the encounter which will increase the officer's actual patrol time, and shortens the time the violator is detained on the traffic stop.

This shared service agreement has enabled the seven participating police departments to share the \$9,126 cost of the Virtual Partner Software and the database state interface hosted by Gloucester Township Police. Without this shared cost each police department would have been responsible individually for these costs – a savings then of \$9,126 per each police department. Additionally, the system requires an annual maintenance contract and service cost of \$3,384 of which will be shared by the participating departments and without this shared service agreement each police department would have been burdened individually with this expense as well.

Upgrading our technology and utilizing information that the officers already have on their computers will allow officers to focus more on the motor vehicle stopped and its occupants when issuing motor vehicle summonses, thus keeping officer safety paramount.

### **Statement – Chief Harry Earle, Gloucester Township Police Department**

The Gloucester Township Police Department has installed eight Advanced Public Safety (APS) QuickTicket™ E-ticket systems in eight police vehicles. These eight systems became operational in December 2011 and in that short period of time we have already seen the cost savings associated with such technology. A total of 327 summonses have been issued using these e-ticketing devices. With a cost of just .07 cents per summons for an e-ticket compared to the cost of .60 for a traditional summons, a savings of approximately \$173 has already occurred with just eight units in service in less than two months. These savings do not account for the personnel labor necessary for processing traditional summonses by the court staff. The Gloucester Township Municipal Court Clerk reported that a clerk would have spent approximately 2.5 hours entering the 327 summonses if they were issued on traditional hard copy summonses. Due to these 327 summonses being issued as printed E-Tickets, there was no processing necessary by any municipal court personnel.

With the Gloucester Township Police Department issuing more than 12,000 summonses each year, a savings of approximately \$6,360 associated with papers costs alone would occur if each police unit was equipped with E-ticketing. Additionally, very significant savings will occur due to there being no entry required by the municipal court staff and less time consumed by officers handwriting summonses so they may perform other essential law enforcement tasks.

In addition to the cost savings associated with printing and labor, additional savings are occurring through the shared access to the Gloucester Township Police Department's technical and computer infrastructure. The Gloucester Township Department aggressively works to maintain, upgrade, and enhance our technology in an effort to improve efficiency, reduce costs, and increase officer safety. This shared implementation of the E-ticketing system is just another example of why it is so important to maintain comprehensive and continued investment in technology in order to be a modern law enforcement agency.

The Gloucester Township Police Department is currently planning on adding up to an additional 28 E-ticketing units in 2012.

### **Statement – Chief John Evans, Magnolia Police Department**

The Magnolia Police Department has partnered with Bellmawr Borough Police, Gloucester Township Police, Haddon Heights Borough Police, Oaklyn Borough Police, Pine Hill Borough Police and Runnemede Borough Police Departments to deploy an automated electronic ticketing system called E-Ticketing. The goal of this multi-jurisdictional effort is to save costs and improve efficiency when issuing motor vehicle summonses.

Under the program the Magnolia Police Department purchased four systems to be utilized in four of their vehicles with plans of purchasing more in the future as the funding becomes available.

The Magnolia Police are confident the switch to inputting ticket information electronically will save municipal tax dollars by cutting overhead costs and reduce a burdensome paperwork load, giving officers more time to



spend on patrol in neighborhoods and interacting with the public. Officer safety will be improved by reducing the amount of time an officer spends stopped along a busy road.

When an officer issues tickets manually, there are many opportunities for error. Names can be misspelled, addresses can be entered incorrectly, and even after the ticket is issued, errors can still occur because a clerk must enter that same handwritten citation into a records system. With manual ticketing systems, it takes about 10 to 15 minutes for officers to issue a citation. In contrast, the E-Ticketing system allows officers to issue a ticket within just two to three minutes.

Increasing officer safety and productivity along with eliminating human error equals more productive patrols, which create safer streets for the residents of Magnolia.

Dear Chief Winters,

Hi. My name is Jamie. I would like to take the time to mention how impressed I was while I resided in Pine Hill, NJ. I relocated from Mercer County to Camden County last year in June. I was scammed by someone in Pine Hill from a Craigslist.org ad. I moved into a home there on Chestnut and rented a room temporarily to get away from a domestic violence situation. Unfortunately, there were some things about the neighborhood that I was residing in and was forced to call the Pine Hill P.D. numerous times in three months. May have made three or four incident reports. Was there when the earthquake and tornado situations which I found quite odd, lol!

I found the dept one day on a walk through town when i just simply took in a license plate into headquarters that was at the corner of my street. Got a great feel for such a small dept!!!!!!!

Then, there was bullying in the neighborhood and I called that in and the officers who responded were great.

A transformer went down during that storm and that was taken care of and investigated promptly.

Then when the "landlord" I was renting from was threatening me and making it hard for me I made some calls as well.

I realize there is crime everywhere you go. I was raised in a police family so of course my mother heading the dept. here raised me to report crimes. Lack of community concern causes more crimes to inflate so I know I was an asset as a resident there. Of course this made some people nervous, probably the ones that were guilty of something, lol (laugh out loud).

I was forcefully removed from that residence on Chestnut and ended up homeless for a month or so and am going to handle that "hardship" case of course against that landlord for neighbors had told me it is a habitual offense that this person does to vulnerable women. But I have that under control of course with the help of the best officer I believe you have on your force, Officer Derek Kramer.

I went on the website of Pine Hill and left him a thank you email as well.

I was very amazed at your dept. Chief!!!! Very impressed that is!!!!!!

I was residing in East Windsor NJ up north at a place for nearly eight years and I had to call the police a hundred times over those years because I had a stalker. The police at that dept in East Windsor absolutely did nothing to help me try the sex offender or even give me resources to re-locate away from the crazed schizophrenic/crack addict.

So I was thinking at that point when my therapist suggested I move how awful the law is and this coming from a daughter brought up in a police family.

I was very disappointed and really battle scarred at the point when I moved to Pine Hill. That man is still being tried in criminal court for non-compliance of a restraining order and so I am also handling that with control of course.

I really don't know why I chose Pine Hill to relocate to but it is a nice small town and I was very involved with the Pastor at the Methodist Church there which, along with that work and the help of your police dept., I actually started to heal and move on. I was there for three months and I couldn't have picked a better place because your police officers, dispatch, and records people, the whole entire dept. really renewed my faith in the system again after 8 years of me not being able to feel protected in East Windsor.

I would like to cast a big THANK YOU to you especially for leading such a great place. You obviously are doing such a GREAT job and your work actually shows to complete strangers like me who come from nowhere, stay only a few months, and leave with such a great renewing feeling that exceptional men/officers really do believe in their jobs to serve and protect, even if it is in a small 4 by 4 mile town and the force being maybe small. It made a huge impact with my recovery so I had to take the time and even if it's just a compliment in an email, then I hope that's enough gratitude to put a smile on your face chief.

One final request, can you please give my regards to Annacome! I did get his email and unfortunately relocated so I couldn't get back to him about that volunteer position on the domestic violence response team. Wasn't able to get back to him so please tell him thank you as well for allowing me that opportunity.

Just fyi, there was only one officer, and I didn't get his name, that treated me with malice. One of the reports that was dispatched to 64 Chestnut was around 9 at night. I already had all this anxiety going in to the town of Pine Hill but I reported Mr. Hough, I believe the second report of three when the officer responded and actually went out of his way to actually threaten me by supporting Mr. Hough to throw me out because I told the officer I was bi-polar. The officer profiled me as a mental person and actually helped Marcus Hough feel powerful in which actually made the future defendant harass me even more thinking he could get away with it. That officer may have been having a bad night because he was very cold and bitter and didn't seem like he liked his job. Now, I already know there are repercussions for officers like that and if I did have the time back then I would have made a complaint against that officer. When I do come to pick up the reports with Ellen, I just pray that officer did accurate reporting on the incident complaint. I know how stressful it is doing that job all too well and it starts to affect the soul when you constantly have to put up with the negatives of society. I'm only mentioning that incident to help if you ever need that info. in such things as promoting or the such.

Overall, I am a teacher, so I would still give your dept. a very BIG A!

I wish you well in the future of your dept.

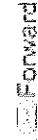
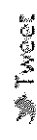

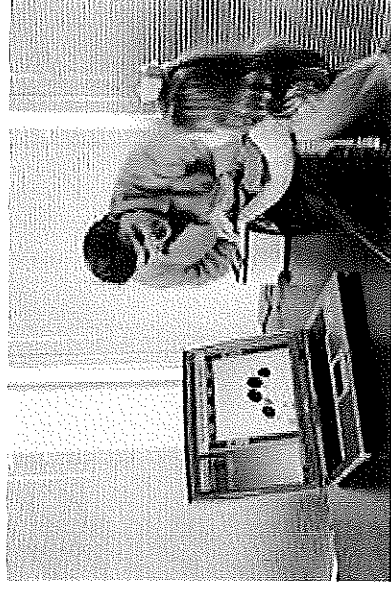
